

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The PhD (Nursing) degree was first instituted on September 27, 1979. Curricular revisions are conducted regularly in order to conform to the constantly changing times, the latest of which were approved by the Board of Regents on Februarv 1, 1995.

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

The main purpose of the program leading to the Doctor of Philosophy (Nursing) is to strengthen and deepen the intellectual and scholastic capability of students in order to enhance the theory and science-based practice of the profession.

The following are the grade requirements for each student to be of good standing in the program:

- 1) General weighted average of 2.00 or better;
- 2) Weighted average of 2.00 or better for the major/required courses: and
- 3) No grade of 5.00 in any academic course.
- **A maximum of 5 years is given to a student to finish the program.

Living accommodations for students may be provided in privately-owned housing units/dorms/apartment hotels. Dorms offer lodging and/or board. There are privately-owned eateries around the school.









The following are the minimum NGOHS requirements:

- 1. Good scholastic record from any recognized institution of higher learning.
- 2. Bachelor's degree in nursing.
- 3. Main Nursing or other health-related field. If master's degree is not in Nursing, the applicant must take relevant courses in the master's level and pass the qualifying examination 4 At least 2 years of experience as a professional nurse in a hospital/community setting or nursing research unit.
- 4. At least 2 published works.
- 5. Duly accomplished Application Form (downloadable through the NGOHS website: ngohs.upm.edu.ph)
- 6. Comply with the General requirements found on the 2nd page of the Application Form (UPM-NGS-OP-01F1)

Graduation Requirements:

- Residency of at least one full academic year immediately prior to the granting of the degree.
- Complete of at least 30 unit of formal courses.
- ☐ Satisfactory completion and submission of the required hard bound copies of thesis, and electronic copy of manuscript.
- GWA of 2.00 or better in major courses and in all courses taken, provided there is no grade of 5.00 in any of these courses.
